## Sandra Waddock

Sandra Waddock is Professor of Management in the Carroll School of Management at Boston College, and Senior Research Fellow at BC Center for Corporate Citizenship. She was a Visiting Scholar at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government in 2006-2007. She is a co-founder of the Leadership for the Change Program at Boston College and the Institute for Responsible Investing in the Center for Corporate Citizenship. A past division chair of the Social Issues in Management Division of the Academy of Management and past board member of the International Association of Business and Society, Dr. Waddock co-chaired the founding of the Academy's Mentoring Committee and the Task Force on Service/Community-Based Learning. She served as Editor of the Journal of Corporate Citizenship from 2002-2004 and as a founding and current member of the editorial board, and currently is regional editor of the Americas. She also is on the board of the Academy of Management Learning and Education, Organization and Environment, and Business Ethics Ouarterly.

Widely published, Dr. Waddock's current research interests encompass corporate citizenship/responsibility, responsibility management, management education, leadership, and large-scale system change. Her latest books are Total Responsibility Management: The Manual with Charles Bodwell, Leading Corporate Citizens: Vision, Values, Value Added, and Learning to Talk with Malcolm, McIntosh and Georg Kell. She has published over 100 articles on corporate citizenship, responsibility management, corporate responsibility, and inter-sector collaboration. Her papers have appeared in The Academy of Management Journal, Strategic Management Journal, and Business and Society, and The Journal of Corporate Citizenship, among many other journals. Her 1997 paper with Samuel B. Graves entitled "Quality of Management and Quality of Stakeholder Are They Synonymous?" received the 1997 Moskowitz Prize from the Social Relations: Investment Forum.

In 2005, Dr. Waddock was named Faculty Pioneer for External Impact by the Aspen Institute Business in Society Program and World Resources Institute, and in 2004, she was awarded the Sumner Marcus Award for Outstanding Service by the Social Issues in Management Division of the Academy of Management, the division's highest award for lifetime achievement. In 2002, she received the Boston College Carroll School of Management's Distinguished Service Award. Dr. Waddock holds her BA from Northeastern University, an MA from Boston College, and an MBA (1979) and DBA (1985) from Boston University.
